Interviewer: When was the last time you spent the whole day without buying anything? With us today on Local Lookout is Chris Dawson, a committed anti-consumerist who'll be taking an active part in next week's Buy Nothing Day. Chris, apart from buying nothing, what exactly is the aim of Buy Nothing Day?

Chris: Firstly, let me say that it is anything but a day of militant action with angry anti-government slogans and boarded-up shops closed for business. We're much more into persuasion than provocation as a means of bringing about change. We want to make shoppers question the need to consume and get them doing other things, like spending time with people, as opposed to spending money on them.

Interviewer: The obvious question here is 'Why?' What's wrong with shopping?

Chris: We're not saying people are bad because they go shopping. But they do need to think more about the products they buy. Whether, for example, their new trainers were produced using cheap labour in countries where workers' rights are virtually non-existent. What materials and production methods went into producing them, and the effect this might have on the planet. It's all very well for shopping malls to offer a wealth of choice, but this should not be at the expense of the environment or developing countries.

Interviewer: Indeed. But if people buy nothing on just one day, is it really going to change all that?

Chris: Well, for quite a few, Buy Nothing Day will indeed be a life-changing experience, not just a one-off thing. In previous years a lot of people have made long-term commitments to consuming less and recycling more. And that can only be a good thing.

Interviewer: So it's an annual event, then?

Chris: Yes, it is. In Europe it's always the last Saturday in November, while in the States they always have theirs on the day after Thanksgiving, at the start of the Christmas shopping season.

Interviewer: Presumably then, Chris, you're against Christmas shopping, too?

Chris: Good question! I'm afraid to say my family would never forgive me if I didn't get them anything, though they know how I feel about the whole thing. I just get so annoyed at the whole run-up to Christmas — already in October the shops have got their Christmas stock in, and the January sales start before you've even had a chance to finish your turkey. So it's handkerchiefs and socks if they're lucky, and maybe something special for my girlfriend.

Interviewer: Is interest in Buy Nothing Day growing? How do you advertise yourselves?

Chris: It's getting bigger every year. Yes, we have our leaflets and posters, but up until now, at least, it's mostly been down to word of mouth. That may change, of course, as we get bigger and better organized. At the moment it's celebrated by about a million people in nearly 50 countries – and that's without the support of TV. In the US, for example, none of the major channels wanted to run the Buy Nothing Day commercial, because they said it went against the country's economic policy.

Presenter: In search of a more youthful appearance, many people nowadays are turning to Botox®, the botulism toxin which is purified and used in small doses to remove unwanted wrinkles. With me is Dr Duncan Evans, who regularly turns up at parties to inject the guests with the toxin, and Lynnie Highfield, one of Dr Evans' patients and a regular Botox partygoer. Dr Evans, perhaps I should begin by asking why this treatment takes place at parties, and not in a surgery?

Dr Evans: That's very simple, really. It's easier, and more convenient, for people to go to a social gathering at a friend's house, than to give up their valuable time getting into central London. When I first started out in this business, I'd often be asked to go to the homes of the rich and famous. Now, though, it's mainly people who've simply got too much going on in their lives to justify making the journey in.

Presenter: Is that your case, Lynnie?

Lynnie: Yes, it is. Plus, of course, we have a good time. I've been to several parties in the last couple of years and you tend to meet up with the same people. That's largely because the benefits of the injection tend to wear off after three or four months so we all keep going back for more.

Presenter: Is it painful?

Lynnie: Just a slight discomfort as the needle goes in, that's all. And there are no serious side effects – just some minor bruising and an outside chance of getting some cold-like symptoms.

Presenter: So how does it work? Why would anyone want to have a poison injected into their body?

Dr Evans: Well, yes, poison it most certainly is, and a deadly one at that. But injected in small quantities into the forehead it does nothing more than paralyse the muscles that cause frown lines and wrinkles. Different people use it for different reasons - to make them feel better, to look younger, to enable them to get work on television - whatever. Of course, I need to set a good example if I want to convince people of the benefits of the treatment, so I regularly have my wife do it for me.

Presenter: Does it work for you?

Dr Evans: Well, I make a living, if that's what you mean, but perhaps I should have started younger - as you can see, I've still got one or two faint lines there.

Presenter: And how about you, Lynnie? Why do you have the injections?

Lynnie: For me, it's a way of growing old gracefully. I mean, we all take care of ourselves. I think it's just an extension of that. I look upon it now as normal maintenance - something that needs doing on a regular basis. The price might stop many people, but I think it's fairly affordable.

Presenter: And have other people noticed the effects?

Lynnie: Yes, they have. And they've grown used to my new look now, but when I first went for treatment, they didn't see much of a difference. Before the treatment I had these terrible hereditary lines, a kind of constant frown, which made it look as though I was permanently unhappy. I was always saying, 'I'm fine. Really. It's just the way I look'. Now I don't have to make excuses for my appearance anymore.

Presenter: You must be very proud of your work, Dr Evans, knowing the effect it can have on people's lives. And it's fun, too, I imagine.

Dr Evans: It's certainly a wonderful feeling seeing people grow in confidence and self-esteem.
